Annette about travelling while leaving your family behind in a war zone.

Hi Annette. Could you tell us about yourself in a few words?

We are family of four, originally came from Ukraine and already live for 13 years in California.

How was life for you growing up in the Ukraine?

Let's say when I was growing as a kid by the age of 16 we didn't travel at all. All summers we as kids were working helping on farms of our relatives. So just imagine how I love beginning of a school each year - finally just learning no hard working until the next summer



When did you start traveling?

As a student we just didn't have enough money to travel. But, as we were working on summers in university, we had an opportunity to stay 2 weeks in our student camp in Crimea. That was a start of love to travel and explore. Finally, we got an opportunity to work few years in the USA. We were so young, no kids. We were so happy to live, explore California. Totally different culture, different cities and people - it was so exciting for us. But we were thinking of staying just a few years. Because all our family, parents, relatives, friends, they are all in Ukraine.

So even with small kids (even when they were 8-9mo old) we were traveling to Ukraine almost every year, even long flights as 13 hours from San Francisco to Istanbul. I don't know whose infants are sleeping all flights. Our kids were awake all 13 hours. But we were traveling anyway, because it was time with our parents, and we were still exploring other parts of Ukraine on trains.

What made you start traveling as a family?

We were so happy to show kids different life, different cultures. We wanted show kids, that they are free to go to what place they like more. I wish we do it more and more. Who knows that the war came?



How did the war change your life?

When Ukraine was first invaded in 2013 we stopped traveling for 3 years. The war was not so far from my parents. After that we started to travel again, even there was already some fights. Hard to explain how we continue to travel there to our parents.

Last time we visit was January 2021. We were planning to came in May 2022 for whole summer . But February 2022 cut our lives in two: before war and after war. We were so shocked to see destroyed buildings (our flat was partially destroyed too, the front line was 5 km from our flat).

Shocked to see pictures of thousands of people waiting for trains to evacuate. I can't forget that pictures.

How are your family and friends doing?

Some of our relatives were stacked in their flats/homes because of constant bombings. No electricity, no water, no food. We feel like passengers on Titanic, who just were late to board, and we are now alive, but some of our friends not. Some of our friends with kids were escaping starting first day of bombings. They were driving more than a week from front line to western part - run out of gas, long lines everywhere, and roads full of cars.

When the foreign forces occupied my hometown, they turned off the mobile connection. I didn't know if my parents are alive. I will never forget that feeling, that you can't do anything, just wait for a call, and try to call again and again, with no connection.

Do you manage to stay in touch with your family?

After liberation by Ukrainian forces, I enjoy every call with my relatives and parents. Each time with face time I do a screenshot with their faces - just to stop that blessing opportunity to see them and talk with them. I know that it could be part call - because they are now on front line with constant bombings, they don't want to go from their home, but I love them so much so I obey their choice even if it is hard for me and break my heart.

Every year now we travel to Europe to meet with relatives in Poland. Kids are still in on line school - which gives us opportunity to travel. It is long way for relatives to travel from eastern parts of Ukraine to Poland - just trains and buses. Long rides, more than 24 hours. In the same

way I feel so sorry for families who were able to escape, but unable to meet with their relatives because not all status /visa allows going back and forth.


