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Lizz Quain, about years of experience as a Worldschooler

Hi Lizz, can you tell us a bit about yourself?

I'm Lizz Quain, a digital nomad, entrepreneur, alternative education advocate and worldschooling mom of 15 year old twin girls. We've been worldschooling for over 7 years, visiting or living in 20 countries (and counting!). Over the years, I've learned so much about how to travel... pre-kids and nowadays as a family. I'm coming up on 50 countries. Some repeatedly!

Traveling, learning about different cultures and exploring the world is a passion of mine, and luckily it became an interest of my kids. I'm also passionate about the best ways for kids to learn. I launched and later sold a children's play cafe business which included a preschool, helped launch and run a global online school for a few years and co-hosted a global homeschooling summit.

What made you decide to Worldschool?

All of those experiences helped me realize that there are many better ways for kids to learn outside the walls of a traditional, antiquated school to better prepare them for the 21st century. The world can be their classroom and there's much to learn online or in-person via local schools around the world (a super way to learn a new language), with tutors, at worldschool hubs, etc. I've also literally met hundreds of other worldschooling families IRL over the years and learned how they live this lifestyle and educate their kids. And I've interviewed many online for my worldschooling video (and audio coming soon) podcast.

There are many ways to worldschool!



How did you start your worldschooling journey?

It took me nearly two years to figure out how best to do it before we launched our test year in 2016. And I was already an experienced traveler... but not yet with kids.

I tracked down a handful of experienced worldschoolers and got inspired by them to try out this lifestyle. I dug through various social media channels and spent a lot of time going down countless rabbit holes. I read the Four Hour Work Week and some other digital nomad and travel-type books and blogs. There wasn't as much out there like there is at present.

How has your family socialised over the years?

My girls and I started traveling in 2016 before worldschool hubs were a thing. I put in a lot of effort searching Facebook groups to find families (worldschooling, expat and locals) who we could meet. We're still friends with many of them and have seen some repeatedly over the years and in various countries! They have become our tribe!

We've since visited a number of casual worldschool communities and more organized worldschool hubs and popups in Mexico, Spain, Italy and we attended Emmy's Bansko hub twice which we highly recommend!

We really enjoy hubs and as a busy working mom, I often like to attend the organized ones as someone else has planned plenty of activities to keep my kids busy, freeing up my time to focus on my work.



How do you help beginning Worldschooling families?

I see so many people using various ways to learn and prepare which is terrific. I'm glad the interest in worldschooling is growing! But I see too many making newbie mistakes once they launch. Some are small mistakes but others quite costly. Many are kinda winging it, figuring out things as they go and hoping for the best. So it's a good idea to be well prepared. It's still a lot of effort to piece things together, to search, follow, post, ask questions and dig around for the answers to key questions. And sometimes you don't even know what questions to ask!

I've created a super-comprehensive and highly-regarded 12-week group course How to Worldschool and Travel Extensively as a Family that I run 3X a year. To better prepare families to start this lifestyle sooner, with more knowledge, confidence and ease. And also make fewer mistakes! And to really know how to help their kids learn during these global adventures to be well-prepared for the future.

What do you want to say to beginning Worldschoolers?

It really is possible to thrive in this lifestyle if done right. If I can manage to do it as a solo parent of two, so can many other families, including yours.


